## SUBJECT: Safety Alert - Threat to U.S. Forces from Lack of Culvert Denial Systems on a Major Highway in Afghanistan

Based on concerns shared with the Office of the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction (SIGAR) by the military, we have identified potentially significant contract fraud in the installation and inspection of culvert denial systems designed to prevent access to roadway culverts by insurgents. Through our preliminary investigative work, we estimate that a large number of culvert denial systems might have been falsely reported by Afghan contractors as complete when, in fact, the denial systems were not installed or were installed in a defective manner, rendering them ineffective and susceptible to compromise by insurgents seeking to emplace IEDs.

The area of is a location of particular concern for this potential threat to U.S. forces. (Attached (Tab I) is a commercial satellite image that further identifies the area of interest.) However, we are concerned that this problem may be more widely spread throughout Afghanistan.

Senior SIGAR personnel in Kabul have formally briefed Major General Kenneth R. Dahl's staff, as well as USACE commanders, and have been working jointly with staff at Task Force 2010 and CENTCOM Joint Theater Support Contracting Command (C-JTSCC). We plan to share all relevant information regarding this threat with TF 2010 or any command you designate. Given the increased risk of IED attack against U.S. forces resulting from the missing or defective culvert denial systems, we are providing this information to you for immediate action and dissemination to all relevant personnel. Again, our foremost interest in this matter is the safety and protection of U.S. forces in Afghanistan.
